

- Become knowledgeable of public issues and how public policy decisions are made
- Become familiar with economic, governmental, educational, health and environmental programs and opportunities in the county.
- Create a network of community leaders and resources.
- Explore rural and urban issues in the program context and complete a class project.
- Create a cadre of citizens willing to participate in a unified effort to shape the future of the community.

Participants need to commit to one day per month for 10 months.

ABOUT ALP

The Juneau County Leadership Program's vision is to facilitate the advanced education and empowerment of emerging leaders for professional, personal and community enrichment. The primary goal of the program is leadership building and development of each participant's natural talents. The Leadership Program welcomes existing and emerging leaders and encourages and celebrates participants' diversity in race, age, philosophy, location, and personal and professional backgrounds.

The Juneau County Leadership Program meets for 10 months on the third Wednesday of each month with graduation on the last session. It begins with a overnight retreat at Upham Woods in southern Juneau County. The remaining months consist of one-day workshops, seminars or tours which provide participants access to programs, businesses, communities and governmental influences in Juneau County encompassing a broad perspective on personal, political, economic, and social issues affecting the County in classroom settings and field experiences. ALP participants will receive a heightened awareness of County issues, networking opportunities and leadership development skills for personal and professional growth.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Applications are reviewed by a Leadership Program Selection Committee. All applicants will be notified upon completion of the interviews.

Annual fee is \$550. Participants may be sponsored by a local business, civic organization, or funded individually. If financial assistance is essential for your participation, or you need to set up a payment plan, please contact the program facilitator.

A blind folded group of citizens walk across State St. in Mauston on a cold winter day. They are led to the Beyond the Daily Grind Café where they sit down and are served their lunches. Still blind folded, they proceed to eat lunch, cautiously feeling the table for their soups and sandwiches. As I sit at the table with my fellow classmates I can't help but listen to the sound of them eating. Some of them lip smacking some delicious squash soup, others slowly sipping their coffee or water, bits and pieces of conversations from across the room whispering to their friends, "What are they doing over there?" "What's up with those blind folds?" There is one woman however that doesn't have a blind fold on because she is legally sight-impaired. Her name is Lori, and she explains to me, "Al-



though this is just a taste of what it is like to be sight impaired, this exercise is a great way for people to experience how adaptable we all are, and that can be an enlightening feeling."

The UW Extension Advanced Leadership Program (ALP) is designed to give participants a deeper level of connectivity within our communities in Juneau County, or in the words of the program Director, Gary Kirking to, "stretch your comfort zone." ALP helps participants develop and/or strengthen leadership skills, such as communication, team building, facilitating change, group problem solving, building consensus, group dynamics and organizational skills.

The intention of the program is building leadership which in turn builds community. Some benefits include: Participants receive a heightened awareness of county issues, increase their networking opportunities and become leadership resources for the community.

County celebrates future leaders

Advanced Leadership Program graduates 11 students

Eleven students took an important step toward community leadership and received words of wisdom from an accomplished leader during this year's Juneau County UW-Extension Advanced Leadership Program graduation

The graduation program, at the extension office in Mauston, was held in correlation with UW-Extension's monthly Lunch N' Learn. Chris Hardie, executive director of the Black River Area Chamber of Commerce, was the event's honored speaker. Before becoming the chamber's director, Hardie built a successful 30-year career in journalism, working as executive editor of the La Crosse Tribune and publisher of the River Valley Newspaper Group's weekly division. In 2001, his worked earned him a Pulitzer Prize nomination.

Hardie still dabbles into journalism, serving as a guest columnist for Agri-View and the La Crosse Tribune where he writes about living on a farm and enjoying a rural lifestyle. He also graduated from the Jackson-Monroe-Vernon Advanced Leadership Program.

The program works to cultivate and support potential county leaders. Students meet for weekly sessions during the 9-month program, focusing on awareness of county-wide issues while improving networking and leadership skills. Through the program, students learn in both classroom and field trip settings to explore the diversity of the county. The program has graduated more than 150 students.

This year's class included Lori Schmiege, Kevin Scott, Sam Spotts, Kayla Thomas, Randy Weiland, Val Nelson, Gesia Nava, Cameron McChesney, Penny Langer, Kayla Heck and Laurie Batten. Scott and Nava were unable to attend the event. Each graduate spoke briefly about how the program has made a positive

impact in their lives and opened their minds to what's important for their communities.

Kayla Thomas, 23, talked about getting young people to join local groups and Lori Schmiege discussed overcoming obstacles as a person who is visually impaired to become a business leader. Cameron McChesney discussed how the program helped him reach for goals in his law enforcement career, while Sam Spotts plans to use the knowledge he gained to start an organic garlic business in Necedah.

'The Advanced Leadership Program really showed me what is right outside our backdoor," Spotts said. "It's really special I got to share those experiences with neighbors and colleagues and now friends. Regardless of ideologies, what I learned most from this program is we all want the same thing. We want a strong community, strong local economy and cultural values and I think as this program progresses and more people take it, I think we can achieve that goal."

During his presentation, Hardie became emotional when talking about a mission trip he attended with his teenage son. He praised this year's graduates for committing to leadership and stressed the important work of community

"Today that young man is a leader in his church and his com-munity and I couldn't be prouder," Hardie said. "All of you today are leaders. Thank you for the time and energy to learning more about our backgrounds or political Juneau County and your region.

In a world that is increasingly full of political noise, we need citizens like you to step up and be leaders. Sometimes it seems easier to not get involved, but leadership is a vital component to the success of any organization and to the health of any community."

Hardie said true leadership is rooted in ethics and integrity and they are the major fundamen-tals in successful leadership. He also told the story of how failure can drive great people to become leaders. Hardie said Abraham Lincoln lost multiple bids for the U.S. Senate before becoming president in 1860 and leading the nation through the Civil War.

"All of you talked about what this program means to you and how much you've learned about Juneau County," Hardie said. "Leadership is going to be the solution to the problems of the world today and it has to come from people in all walks of life, not just in Washington and Madison."


